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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Bhartiya Rashtriya Shikshan Sanstha's Shankarrao Jawale-Patil Arts, Science & Commerce College, Lohara is established in the year 2002 by the visionary Dr. Shesherao Patil with a mission to provide quality education to students from rural and weaker sections of the society. It is the pioneering education institution in Lohara taluka of Osmanabad district. The college has the distinction of being the first higher education institute established at taluka level. The College is located in rural area and provides graduate education in Arts, Commerce & Science streams. Arts and Commerce faculties are granted. The science faculty of our college is permanently non-grant. The college strives to provide good education with the help of facilities like library, laboratories, good health and organize various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the overall development of the students. The college has adequate facilities of science laboratories and library. However, the college is from one of the most educationally backward areas of India, its student strength is more than 500.

The college provides job oriented and skill-based subjects like certificate course in English Communication. The college is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. College has also a study centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik. The college is not yet accredited by the NAAC and has been facing 1st cycle. The major portion of the information has been consolidated in the seven criteria devised by the NAAC and summarized as following.

“To provide Quality Education for privileged and rural community”.

Mission

- To give knowledge and skills to the students.
- To instil moral values among students through education.
- To make available quality higher education to the community.
- To bring an educationally, socially and economically backward society to the main stream of education.
- To provide quality education to socially and economically backward classes.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The staff our college is dedicated, approachable, sincere and committed to development of the students. faculties have active participation in extension and social activities. The faculty members provide access to higher education to deprive and working class. Above 75% faculties of our college are having Ph.D. degree.

Students are encouraged to participate in curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Our committed staff develops direct communication with students, parents, alumni and administrators. Teaching staff actively engaged in qualitative research work by presenting papers, and publishing articles. Faculty provides access to higher education to deprived and working-class students. Students are encouraged to participate in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

Institutional Weakness

Science stream of our college is self-financed, therefore most of seats of teachers are remain vacant. Though, the college has less ICT infrastructure our faculty makes us of ICT in teaching and learning. No separate building is for Library and less availability of reference books is another constraint. The dropout rate is a cause of concern for us. The institution comes in the draught prone area where large number of people struggle for basic needs of livelihood. Small campus of our college does not allow major infrastructure developments and it doesn't allow to introduce PG departments. We have insufficient linkages with industry and research institutions.

Institutional Opportunity

To achieve 2(f) and 12(b) recognition from UGC is one of the major concerns of the college. To develop infrastructure facilities including classrooms and separate building for library. Our college has a Competitive Examination Guidance Cell which provides valuable guidance for competitive examinations. The college is focusing on multi-disciplinary approach for better teaching learning, and utilizing services of alumni. The institution is trying to arrange State/National level Conferences, Seminars and Workshops. Awareness of environment among students through extension work and eco-friendly programmes.

Institutional Challenge

The unemployability among the pass out students is a matter of concern. Dropout rate due to migration in search of employment is also a challenge. Presently our tehsil has three-degree colleges therefore we have facing competition from those colleges. Development of infrastructure facilities is one of the challenges before the college. The institution is trying to receive grant for science stream. Inadequate facilities of transportation to the students from rural area is major constraints.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is committed for social development, employability and development of students. Academic Calendar is prepared for effective implementation of syllabus, referring the university calendar. The teaching plans, syllabus completion reports and notes of the teachers are regularly verified. For smooth running of

teaching-learning process in the class, the institute prepares the master timetable & departmental time table.

Implementation of curriculum is followed meticulously by every faculty member. The College follows syllabus framed by university; it is not allowed to make any modification in the prescribed syllabus framed by parent university. Institute offers more liveness to students to choose the options in the subjects and Choice Based Credit System for B. Com. students. Maximum teachers work as the paper setter for University level examination while all permanent teaching staff work as paper assessors in University level examination. The College introduced various certificate courses on self-financing. College tries to obtain active participation of students in various other activities like tree plantation, social awareness programmes etc. For the environmental sustainability development and making students aware about the importance of environment by organizing various activities. Prescribed syllabus of B.A. III year dealt with the project of work of students. Environment Committee is established in the institution for plantation of the trees and their maintenance and to keep the campus clean. There is a committee for collection, analysis and deciding the course of action of feedback of stakeholders like students, teachers, alumni and employers.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The students are admitted on 'First Come First Serve' basis. The reservation policy of the Maharashtra State Government and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University is followed by the institution. The College has highly qualified permanent teaching staff including 11 Faculties are Ph. D. holders and 03 Ph.D. guides out of 16 full time teachers. The students admitted from diverse backgrounds. However, the college is located in very remote area, all teachers, permanent and temporary, work hard for students. Slow and Advance learners are identified on the basis of previous marks and performance in Unit tests. The institution organizes industrial visit and study tour for experiential learning. Remedial classes are conducted for weak students. The teachers of the institution use ICT in teaching and learning process. The institution has regular practice of measuring Cos, POs and SPOs, as per their performance in the classroom, in the internal examination and university level examination. The internal assessment of institution is transparent and student's grievances are redressed timely. Guest lecturers invited for academic enrichment. Innovative teaching methods are followed properly.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Institution conducted Conference and Webinars and workshops on various themes. In research area, the notable thing is that more than 263 research Papers are published during Assessment period the promotion to research work is given in the college so 03 faculties are research supervisors. The College has conducted the extension activities through NSS department and organized Blood Donation camps in NSS Special Camps. The institution organized Kerala Flood Relief Rally in Lohara on 4th September 2018. The citizens of Lohara donated the money generously and collected 6620 rupees to donate to the flood affected people of Kerala. The college organized Sangli-Kolhapur Flood Relief Rally on 22nd August 2019. The citizens of the Lohara donated wholeheartedly and collected 7951 rupees to donate to the flood affected people. In extension work college staff with students conducted social survey under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan in different villages The institution conducts extension and outreach activity in collaboration.

The college has participated in Tree Plantation Programme in Lohara. The institution has signed MoU and have linkages with other institutions. The institution organized field visits and industrial tour to make our students aware about different issues and consequently to make their holistic development. MoU with other institution signed to develop the collaborative activity and knowledge purpose. The institution has several

linkages and collaborations with other institutions. The college organizes industrial and study visit to various places for the experiential learning.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has total 5.21 Acres of land area. The built-up area is 1392.03 square meters. There are well-constructed 15 classrooms equipped with dual desks and blackboards. There are 2 classrooms with projector and screens facility. The ramp is available for Physically Challenged students and other stakeholders. Drinking water facility is made available. Fire Extinguisher is available in the college. Classrooms and other essential required facilities are provided for B.A., B. Com. and B.Sc. such as desks, fans, lights, etc. Library with books and reference books. The college management generates their own fund and utilizes it for overall development of students. The College has 17 Computers, one laptop, 7 Printers, four all in one Printers, one digital photo Camera, One Wi-Fi Router, One Wi-Fi Modem, One Bio-Metric Machine, One Battery Back-up Set, Two Projectors, One Invertor and Solar Lamp.

The college has an adequate playground having an area is 3 acres which helps and encourages for outdoor games as Kho-Kho, Kabaddi and Volleyball, Cricket as well as indoor games like carom and chess amongst others. Javelin, Discus, Shot-Put, Shuttle Cocks and Net, Ball, Poles, Boards etc. equipment are available in the sports department. For cultural activities dice, mic, speaker and cultural instruments are available. So, Shankarrao Jawale Patil Arts, Science & Commerce College maintains physical and academic facilities for effective teaching and learning. The institution updates the ICT facilities including Wi-Fi regularly. The institution uses ILMS through e-Vidya library software. The institution spends amount on physical and support facilities as well as on Library books and journals. The college has computer lab which provides the learning resources to students. The institution has fibre optic internet connection with 200 MBPS speed. There are established procedures system and procedures for maintaining physical, academic and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

The college provides Scholarship and other facilities to students. The college has registered Alumni Association. The College establishes a student council for active participation of students in the academic & administrative bodies and it empowers the students to gain leadership qualities and execution skills. Students are involved in several committees as NSS Advisory Committee, CDC, IQAC, Code of Conduct Committee, Placement Cell, Sports Committee, Cultural Committee, Competitive Examination Guidance Centre, Women Empowerment Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Voters Literacy Club etc. The college takes initiatives for the skill development of students including Soft Skill, Communication Skills, health and hygiene and ICT Skills. communication skill and other ICT skills. The students of the institution participate in events/competitions organized by the institution and other institutions. The institution conducts Competitive examination and career guidance for the students. Campus interviews are conducted for the placement of students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college runs under the auspices of Bhartiya Rashtriya Shikshan Sanstha, Lohara. The institution follows the rules of UGC, Government of Maharashtra and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. Vision and Mission of the college are defined with the aim to provide excellence in education to all students located to nearby college area. All these committees organize various activities and events under

the guidance of NAAC office. The college believes in the decentralization of work so different kinds of committees are formed to implement the annual plan of college such as Time Table Committee, Cultural Committee, Exam Committee, NSS committee, Environmental Committee etc. Each committee headed by a chief and some other members. The college conducts Faculty Development Programs for teaching and non-teaching staff. The college promotes to complete Orientation Program, Refresher course, FDP and STC. The API through PBAS forms for teaching and non-teaching staffs is collected per year. Under the welfare schemes Medical Leave, Casual Leave, Earn Leave, Maternity Leave, Duty Leave etc. are provided and in financial support college encourages for home loans and personal loans from different banks. Staff of the college started Self Help Group for the financial help. The college is ISO certified 9001:2015.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college is bound for the security of girl students and women staff. CCTV cameras are installed at the college campus for the security of girls. Waste management has been done in every academic year. The institution worked for the water conservation through Rain water harvesting. Solar lamp is available at the campus. The college did the green and energy audit from the auditing agency. No vehicle day is followed by the institution on second and fourth Friday of the month. Tree plantation has been done every year. The college celebrates national festivals, anniversaries, seminars, and other special events as per the GR of State Government. To develop an interest in language, Marathi, Hindi and English Language days are celebrated and Literary Associations are established. Various activities like reading, writing, and speech are conducted. To inculcate human values and social responsibilities, the program such as AIDS awareness program and rally, population control is arranged in the college. The best practice 'Plant Trees, Save Environment' in the college is that Marathwada is a region where water is scarce, and in the Latur district the water where has to be supplied by train, this practice was successfully implemented. Second best practice is The Use of WhatsApp groups for teaching-learning process and related communication. This helped for the progress of students and use of ICT. The institution has focussing on thrust and priority for the well being of rural students. Several programmes are organized for the students and society. Tree plantation is done every year. The institution has been working for water conservation of adopted villages.

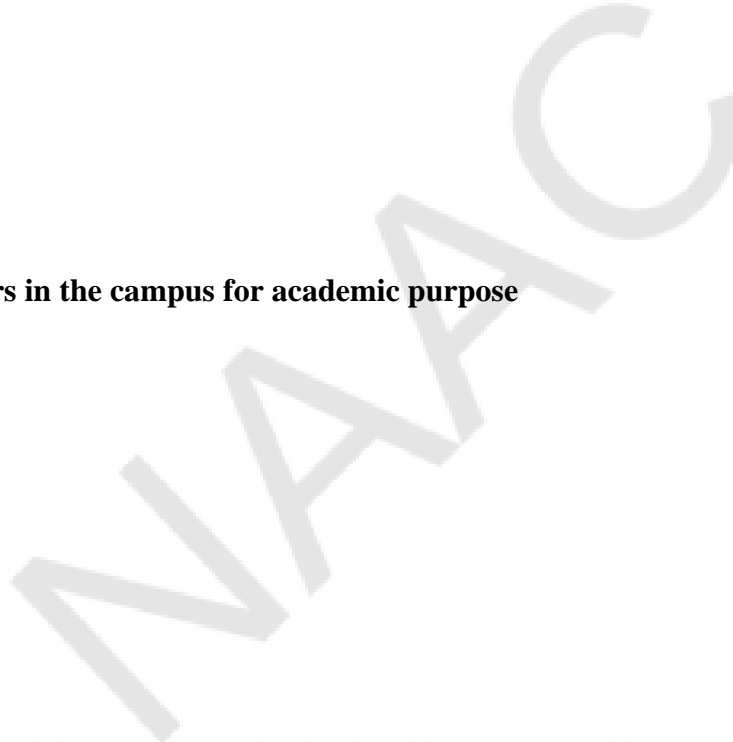

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college, being affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, takes various steps towards effectively delivering the curriculum. The principal conducts a meeting with faculty members at the beginning and end of every semester to assess the progress of curriculum. The university circulates the academic calendar at the beginning of the academic year. On the basis of this academic calendar, IQAC prepares the action plan of the academic year which is followed by every department of the college. Faculty member submits a teaching plan at the beginning of the semester to the HOD. After discussion on this, it is submitted to the Principal. The progress of the department is maintained through unit tests and seminars. Time table is prepared well in advance before the commencement of each semester. The faculty is required to submit Daily Teaching Report and get it signed by Principal.

From time to time the University sends notices and circulars to the institution so that they are kept abreast of developments in the curriculum. Teachers are encouraged by the institution to attend seminars. College library provides text books and reference books to the faculty for the development of curriculum. The Institution constantly strives to upgrade its infrastructure to meet the challenges of a technology driven environment and to meet the demands of the curriculum. Guest lectures are conducted to create an interface between the students and experts from academic and financial institutions. Feedbacks are collected from students regarding curriculum.

Curricular and extracurricular activities are conducted through the different committees & cells. They planned well and executes the activity as per the schedule mentioned in the academic calendar. Certificate courses such as Marathi Grammar for Competitive Examination, Hindi Bhasha ka Prachar Tatha Prasara, Panchayati Raj and Rural Development, Human Rights, Travel and Tourism and Certificate Course in Spoken English are organized to supplement the degree course.

The institution follows the Academic Calendar of the parent University. The Academic calendar of the

college consists of the process of Continuous Internal Evaluation. The institution has adopted the following major reforms of the university: The semester pattern of examination is introduced by the University from June 2009. The distribution of the work of teaching is done in the departmental meetings, taking into account the academic calendar of the college. The teachers help the slow learners as well as extend guidance to the advanced learners. Students can contact the teachers for solving difficulties and for additional guidance.

The evaluation schedule of the students is broadly divided into two parts: Internal Evaluation and External Evaluation. A tentative schedule for internal assessment (test, tutorial, group discussion, seminars, etc.) has been mentioned in the academic calendar, but a teacher of the concerned subject has full authority to conduct tests as and when the syllabus is completed at the end of the semester.

The Internal evaluation Pattern is introduced for the B.Com. I and II and III year and the pattern is 80:20. However, 20 marks are allotted for internals submitted by the students. The college conducts various evaluation methods for students apart from university evaluation pattern including tests.

The External Evaluation of the students includes assessment of the performance of the students in Theory, Practical and Viva- Voce of the Projects. B.A. Third year project paper also carries 20 marks for oral examination out of 100. The schedule of the External Evaluation is prepared by the University Authorities and conveyed to the colleges. The paper setting work is done at the University level and the rest of the work related to conduction of the examination is done at the college level.

In the execution of the examination schedules the college makes available the services of teaching and non-teaching staff, college classrooms and laboratories for conducting the examinations. The college deposes the concerned teachers when the services of the college teachers are required by the University for Assessment and evaluation at other centres.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

The institution integrates the cross-cutting issues like Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the curriculum. All 15 courses cover the subjects like humanities and social sciences, air pollution and control, disaster management, industrial management and entrepreneurship, soft skill, human rights etc.

Professional Ethics:

Professional ethics are taught to students as part of their holistic development. Professional ethics are imbibed amongst the students by encouraging them to undertake the spoken English course. Campus interviews are organized to offer the students an opportunity to undertake the training related to professional ethics.

Gender:

Annual gender sensitization action plan is prepared by the institution. The institution organizes programmes for girl students including health check-up camps, self-defence training and workshop related to women's laws. The girl students are promoted to participate to awaken students' sensibility on gender issues in various activities and programs organized by National Service Scheme, Cultural Department and Women Empowerment Cell.

Human Values

Human values are taught to the students through regular teaching in the classroom by all the faculties of the institution. Blood donation camps and various programs are organized by the college. Death and birth anniversaries of great people and organization of various programs on the occasion of the same. Celebration of national days, rally on World AIDS Day etc. organized for human values.

Environment and Sustainability:

The institute has established a National Service Scheme (NSS) unit under Dr. B. A. M. U. NSS organizes activities related to environment and sustainability like tree plantation, Nala bandhara and Swachha Bharat Abhiyan. Speech on environment organized by the college. Compulsory Environment course is prescribed for the second-year classes. The NSS department has adopted a nearby village to conduct seven days of Special Camp. In the camp, programs related to Environment Sustainability are conducted. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Assessment of learning level of student is a continuous process. Each student is given personal attention to his/her academic performance. The class mentors will identify advanced learners and slow learners, on the basis of the marks obtained in their qualifying examinations, performance in tests and assignments, and participation in classroom discussions, and also interaction with the students. With the help of that both advance and weak students can get easily identified. Parents are communicated the progress of their students through parent meet. Student's counselling is done through the allotted mentors and subject teachers. College conducts soft skills programmes for the skill development and career opportunities.

Advanced Learners:

The concerned teachers are advised to accelerate them academically through personal attention and tests. They are motivated to participate in workshops, and research activities (especially 'Avishkar' Competition), which are conducted by the University and other colleges. These students are given an opportunity to participate in elocution and other competitions, wall paper publication and inter institution competitions. advanced learners are provided coaching classes for competitive examination guidance. The institution organizes placement drives for students. Advance learners are felicitated and honoured for their achievements in various competitions.

Slow Learners:

Teachers bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students through extra coaching and counselling to weak students means slow learners. Bridge courses are run for B.Com. first year students to acquaint with accountancy. There is an attempt to reduce the knowledge gap of students by conducting remedial coaching, seminars, guest lectures, extra lectures, etc. The students of the final year have special assistance from the library to have an access to the books and journals for their compulsory projects. The teacher solves the educational and psychological problems of students. In order to improve their learning skills, the students are advised and encouraged to work on the previous year's question papers. Learning materials like notes, question banks, etc. are provided to slow learners. Tests and seminars are conducted to improve their performance. Regular attendance monitoring, collecting individual feedback ensures them of an effective teaching-learning process.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Student Centric Method:

The college implements learning -teaching process in such a way that they become more student centric. The college is constantly striving for the holistic development of the students. All the activities and plans of the college are prepared and implemented with the students as the focal point.

Experiential Learning:

The college organizes study tour to students for experiential learning. This helps students to get the first-hand experience of historical places, architecture and geographical places and industry. Therefore, they can easily and with a healthy mind get subject knowledge of history, geography, radio and literary works by taking the practical experience of the subject matter in the book related to their curriculum. Final year nine courses of arts faculties have the paper of project writing and students are given projects by survey and field visit. Students of Political Science and Public Administration visited to Tehsil Office, Panchayat Samiti, Court to know the work of offices. Commerce department conducted Bank visit for real experience. Through the industrial trip, the students get a first-hand understanding of the working methods in the industry, the process of manufacturing various commodities, financial transactions and the experience of the industrial environment. Therefore, students can understand the course content of subjects like economics and commerce with interest.

Participative learning:

The learning is made more participatory and socialistic by organizing activities like group discussions, field visits, seminars, project writing, publication of wallpapers etc. Language and Literature Association, Social Science associations, Commerce Associations have been established to enrich the knowledge base of the students in their respective areas. The college also organizes co-curricular, extra-curricular and cultural events which help the students in developing their all-round personality. Birthdays and anniversaries of great personalities are celebrated in the college every year as per the circulars of State Government and of affiliating University. Through these celebrations, the struggle, vision, and life of these all-great leaders are shared with students. They also share the thoughts and philosophy of these great and visionary personas. It helps to inculcate social and moral values amongst students. Students participated in surveys including Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and Socio-Economic condition of Vadar Nomadic tribe.

Problem Solving Method:

Teachers give several problems to the students and ask them to solve them, sometimes individually or sometimes in groups. This helps them to develop decision-making skills, cooperation, coordinating skills amongst students. College conducts remedial coaching to solve the problem of students. Experts are invited by the institution to deliver their thought as guest lecturers. So, the teachers solve the doubts of students.

The teachers use google classroom as a learning resource; assignments, study material and other important documents are provided to the students. Though the college is located in rural area, but teachers prefer and inspires students to use ICT tools.

The Principal and Management always support and motivate all teachers to use ICT Tools in the teaching learning process. Teachers give important links and software to students. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The college is affiliated with Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. As per the norms of affiliating universities, the college has to follow a pattern. The college has two methods of assessment and evaluation one is our parent University defined assessment and another is college defined assessment. Semester exams are conducted in the first and second term of every academic year. The students should have to appear for the 01-unit test for each semester. The schedule of the internal examination is provided at the beginning of the semester, in the form of an academic calendar and CIE. Internal assessment comprises unit test, seminars, and group discussions. After evaluation of tests the results should be submitted to the IQAC office through HODs for further analysis. B. A. III mandatory project work and the practical examination is conducted in the presence of internal as well as external examiners duly appointed by the affiliated university.

College conducts the internal test of the students and answer sheets are given back to students. Further these answer sheets are evaluated and faculty suggests the modification/addition to students for university examination. They are also made aware of the evaluation pattern. A student feeling dissatisfied in assessment is free to discuss it with the concerned teacher. If it is found that some injustice is done to him/her, it is amended and thus transparency is maintained in the internal assessment process.

The teachers decide the weightage to assess overall development of the students. The weightages vary from teacher to teacher. The weightages cover the attendance of the students, participation in the classroom discussion, participation in classroom discussion, behaviour in the classroom and the college campus, participation in cultural and academic activities.

However, the institution maintains transparency in internal assessment.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. It interacts with exam committee and the students. Principal of the college solves the grievances related to examination in a stipulated time. IQAC consistently work on the student centric activities. It interacts with exam committee and the students. At the beginning of the semester, faculty members inform the students about the various components in the assessment process during the semester. The college prepares an academic calendar including an internal examination schedule. The college conducts tests, seminar, group discussion, etc. to assess the performance of students. Two internal tests are conducted for each paper during the year by the concerned teacher. To assist the student in a fair and impartial way we ensure student's grievances are resolved promptly and confidentiality is maintained. If students have any queries about the evaluation of their internal performance, they are guided individually to solve their queries.

The timely notices, circulars are displayed on the notice board, and on the mobile through WhatsApp or text message. The corrected answer paper of the students is distributed to them for the verification by the students and any grievance is redressed immediately. The institutional reforms in continuous evaluation system are related to create interest for the study and to make the students more familiar with the university examination pattern.

The institutional measures used for the evaluation are to direct and lead the students confidently towards university examination. In a university Examination, if the student scores fewer marks than expected, he/she can apply for revaluation for that subject after paying the prescribed fee. Grievances related to the university examination are reported in time to the university authorities. If students have any complaints regarding the valuation of answer sheets, then they can drop their complaint to the exam committee complaint box. All the mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time bounded and efficient.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Teachers and students are aware of the stated Programme and course outcomes of the Programmes offered by the institution.

Response:

The program and course outcomes are defined for each paper and each subject as per the objectives of the curriculum defined by the affiliating university. In their respective classes the teachers give the prescribed syllabus of the course to the students and tell them about the course outcome. Program outcomes, Program specific outcomes and Course outcomes for all programs offered by the institution are intimated to the teachers, and students. The details of the course content and course outcome are displayed in the Institutional website. The program outcomes, course outcomes, and program-specific outcomes are defined for each short bit of text of the curriculum (Each Paper and each subject) and in the classroom through oral question-answer sessions, presentation, debates, quiz, etc. Every subject teacher, as well as mentor, is working devotedly to achieve it.

Throughout the programme duration through various tests and examinations their attainment is assessed and suggestions for improvement are given. Faculty members works to analyse the result of students. The institution permits teachers to participate in workshops, seminars, conferences and FDPs to enrich them to attain the outcomes.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The college often focuses on attainment of Programme outcomes and Course outcomes. The college systematically makes plan to evaluate the students from the first year to the third year. The purpose of the student's academic journey is elaborated through the principal's address, expert lectures, and class room interaction.

The principal of the college consistently keeps the subject teachers aware of the guidelines by the university about the process of evaluation with the changes, if any. The guidelines of the university are provided to the subject teachers. The answer books of unit tests are shown to the students and they are made known of their shortcomings in their answers. They are advised as to how they can improve their answers.

Mechanism:

Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes at college level are evaluated through Direct Method and Indirect Method which helps to improve the education quality of the college and graduates.

Direct Method:

At the end of each term, the university conducts the semester examination to evaluate the attainment of the

POs, PSOs and Cos. The teachers participate in the assessment process of the answer sheets of the students. At the time of assessment, teachers also assess the attainment of POs and Cos of the students.

The result analysis by each department is also one of the methods to check the attainment of POs and Cos. The result of students at university examination is displayed in exam department which is also taken into consideration while assessing the achievement of the particular department. The examination committee initiates to record its observation and suggestions for further improvement.

Unit tests, group discussion, class seminars, field projects etc. are conducted for the evaluation of POs and Cos. Study tours, industrial visits, field visits, and experiential learning are also the part of the evaluation of the attainment of the programme and course outcomes. Various competitions such as Elocution, Essay-Writing, Debate, Rangoli, etc. are organized for the evaluation of the outcomes. Annual practical examinations of the students of Geography, Commerce, Chemistry, Physics, Botany and Zoology are carried out at the college level with the presence of External Examiners appointed by the University. In these examinations too the attainment of POs and Cos are evaluated.

Indirect Method:

Evaluation of attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes is done through indirect method at college level such as feedbacks are collected from the students, alumni, parents during their meet.

3.3 Extension Activities

3.3.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

Outreach is an integral part of college educational programme. It imbibes the sense of social responsibility among the students. It engages the students in social service that meets the community needs. In extension work college staff with the help of students conducted social survey under **Unnat Bharat Abhiyan**. The issues are discussed and the institution is planning to start technology-based projects for these villages. The institution participated in the **District Internship Programme** organized Govt of India and Maharashtra state government because Osmanabad is one of the backward districts in India. The socio-economic survey was conducted by our college students in different villages.

The department of sociology conducted **Social Survey** to know the condition of nomadic tribe people particularly the 'Vadar' caste to know the socio-economic condition of these people. The college is aware of social commitment; therefore, the college always organizes different extension activities. The college celebrates the **Birth and Death Anniversaries** of the national leaders to create the feeling of national integration and for good citizenship. The social responsibility has been nurtured in our students through the following extension activities organized by our institute.

The institution organized **Kerala Flood Relief Rally** in Lohara on 4th September 2018. The citizens of Lohara donated the money generously and collected **6620 rupees** to donate to the flood affected people of Kerala. The college organized **Sangli-Kolhapur Flood Relief Rally** on 22nd August 2019. The citizens of the Lohara donated wholeheartedly and collected **7951 rupees** to donate to the flood affected people.

The NSS organizes a **residential seven-day camp in adopted village** and several activities were carried out by NSS volunteers addressing social issues which include **tree plantation**, water conservation through **construction of Bandhara and talk on water conservation by Paani Foundation, Shramdan, Environmental awareness, Women empowerment, Blood donation camp, Health check-up camp, Veterinary camp, and anti- superstition activity talk with practical etc. Cleanliness activities** organize during the seven-day camp and during the Lord Ganesh festival Excretion.

Voter Awareness program has been arranged in the college, and the aim of this programme is the voters are educated about the polling process and made aware of the political parties, their manifestos and backgrounds of the contesting candidates to help them for casting their valuable votes. However, all the college students and the individuals in society who have completed 18 years of the age were educated to register their name in Voter's list.

The **awareness raising about the HIV/AIDS** occurrence and spread is very significant in protecting the people from the epidemic. The institution organizes talk and rallies on AIDS awareness. The volunteers provided information, education and communication on HIV/AIDS prevention to the people.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

The welfare schemes are offered to the teaching and non-teaching staff with an intention to create a healthy atmosphere in the college. Duty Leave is granted to attain for participation of various professional development activities. For the female teachers 180 days (6 months) maternity leave is given twice in the whole service tenure.

Defined Contribution Pension Scheme (DCPS) / National Pension Scheme (NPS): Employees appointed after 1st November 2005 have been availing DCPS. Regular record about transactions of GPF about interest and government share is maintained annually. The conversion of DCPS into NPS is under process by the State Government.

Life Insurance Scheme (LIC): The monthly premium is deducted from the salary of the employee. In the event of death, the insurance amount is given to the nearest relative, or the maturity amount is paid on superannuation.

The benefits of career advancement schemes are given to those who achieve academic milestones. College gives assurance to the loan disbursing agency on behalf of the employee for personal and home loan. The college formed Self Help Group for the financial needs of the staff. College celebrates the Birthdays of every staff member to give inspiration to them. The institution felicitates the teachers after obtaining the Ph.D. and they are permitted to attend seminar, conferences, workshop and training programmes of various HRDC centres. Grievance Redressal committee of the college solves the grievances of the staff members. College encourages non-teaching staff to pursue further studies. The college provides uniforms to peons.

Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) has been implemented by the university under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS). The College office maintains the Service Book of every teacher. There is performance appraisal system which is followed for teaching staff includes teaching, learning and evaluation related strategies, co-curricular, extension, professional development activity and contribution in research.

The college evaluates the faculty on the basis of self-Appraisal report submitted by each faculty at the end of each Academic Year. These forms are assessed by the principal and requisite remarks are given for better performances. The entries in the academic diary are verified by the principal. Attendance reports of the students are maintained by the concerned faculty. Receipt of the amount received is given to the students after receiving the fee for TC / Bonafide / Admission fee etc. Mr. Nandkishor Mane keeps all the records of the received amount under the proper heads. Then, the available funds are distributed according to the needs of the departments. Expenditure is made with the prior permission of the Principal/Management. Receipts for all the collections are given and the amount is deposited in banks. All the official formalities are completed and the record is maintained. The college has internal and external audit mechanism to monitor the utilization of the budget effectively and efficiently. The utilization of the budget is monitored regularly by the management. Separate ledgers are maintained under different heads.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes by suggesting, preparing plans and organising certain activities. The primary focus of higher education in India is to promote research.

The IQAC initiated this practice to inculcate research culture in the staff and the students. A research committee is constituted as per the recommendations of IQAC in the college which takes initiatives for all activities related to research. The committee encourages the faculty to pursue research work, to obtain guideship, provide guidance to research scholars. As a result, 11 permanent faculty of our college have got the Ph.D. degree and remaining 4 are doing their research. The Ph.D. awardees are felicitated by the college. Faculty are encouraged for research paper presentation in the national, international seminars, conferences and to publish quality research articles and chapters in books. Consequently, more than 288 research papers, in the last five years, are published by our teachers.

Faculty Development Program and Conference, Webinars and Workshops are organised by IQAC. In academic year 2018-2019 institution organized A Workshop on the Preparation of NAAC organized by the IQAC. In academic year 2019-2020 the institution organized one day National E-Conference on Environment and Sustainable Development of Rural area: Issues, Problems and Solutions. In this conference teachers presented their papers. In same year institution organized a workshop on Intellectual Property Rights. In the academic year 2020-21 institution organized National Webinar on Revised Assessment and Accreditations Framework of NAAC with Specific Reference to Qualitative Metrics. In the same year institution organized National Webinar on Migration and Literature. The teachers are always promoted to complete RC, OC, STC & FDP programmes.

Apart from this IQAC takes different quality initiatives in the form of regular fill up of the information of the AISHE. The college has taken initiatives for Green Audit. Academic Audit and Administrative Audit is regularly conducted by the University. It also reviews the performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff, periodically.

3. The Context

The volunteers of the N.S.S. department and all the teaching and non-teaching staff participated in tree plantation and played a vital role. In the best practice 'Plant Trees, Save Environment' to implement this activity, Environment Committee has been established by the college. Dr. Parvati Mane is the head of the committee. Dr. Sudarshan Sonvane, Dr. S.N. Birajdar are appointed as the members of the committee. The committee started to work for trees plantation during the rainy season every year. Omerga- Lohara M.L. A. Dnyanraj Chougule participated in the tree plantation program of the year 2017-2018.

The Trees include Neem, Almond, Coconut Tree, Saraca Asoka, Curry Tree, Gulmohor, Ebony, Black plum tree, Bunyan tree etc. Thus, the total number of trees planted during the five years from 2016-2017 to 2020-2021 under 'Best Practice' is 263.

4. The Practice:

The specialty of the best practice 'Plant Trees, Save Environment' in our college is that Marathwada is a region where water is scarce, and in the Osmanabad district is also one of the droughts prone and backward districts where this practice was successfully implemented. The trees have been donated to the college as a gift by the Principal, Professors, non-teaching staff, students, parents and farmers. To grow the trees, they need to be watered. The students, Volunteers, Professors and the Environment Committee make efforts to save the trees. This practice inspires many students, parents, citizens, schools and offices for plantation by their own. This activity is not only useful for the college students and staff but other social stakeholders. The Parent University has prescribed 'Environment Science' as a compulsory subject for the second-year students. Practical knowledge of environment protection can be gained through 'Plant Trees, Save Environment' program.

5. Evidence of Success

1. Many trees are growing and students are getting benefit of its shadow and studying underneath of trees.
2. Trees are giving a natural beautiful look to the campus and give fresh air.

3. The trees grow fast and within five years the campus became green.
4. Star fences have been erected on all sides of the college to protect the trees from animals.
5. Many students have started planting trees at home in their village.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

1. The problem of water is main problem in this location.
2. The soil is not fertile. Therefore, it is difficult to grow trees. The college has its bore well but in summer season the water level goes down so plants and trees can't get enough water.
3. The water supply for trees through the bore well was not enough, especially in the summer season.
4. Some passers-by of the road and animals used to destroy the trees on the campus as there was no fencing.

Other Information:

'Plant Trees, Save Environment' is not only as a best practice but also as a social enterprise. The college wants to give the message of planting and cultivating trees as well as keeping the environmental balance by increasing the participation of the society. In the future, the college wants to implement the program outside the campus also. The aim of the college in future is to save the trees that are rare, the trees that exist in nature but rarely found in our surrounding should be saved and the people should be inspired to plant more and more trees is the aim of the college. The college also aims at planting medicinal and useful trees that can be used for the benefit of society.

Best Practice II

1. Title of the Practice

The Use of WhatsApp groups for teaching-learning process and related communication.

2. Objectives of the practice

1. To make teaching learning process more interactive.
2. To give notification and enhances the possibilities of enhancing the effectiveness of teaching learning process with other social media devices.
3. To make proper use of WhatsApp for timely transmission of college related important information.
4. To make effective use of WhatsApp tool to communicate students in the situation of an emergency.
5. To give information related to exam and other academic activities.

3. The Context

With the increasing use of internet-based technologies, WhatsApp has become the most popular social media among the young generation. This app is easily available and can be downloaded without any charge from the Play Stores. The app is user friendly one can share various types of information either with individual or in the groups in the forms of text, image, video and other formats. Faculty can share notes on WhatsApp group. It will help to collect academic information through google form. As it is linked with the contact list available in the phone, the messages can directly be sent without having the restrictions of location. An ever-increasing use of internet-based facilities by the young generation becomes a reality. As ICT exerted its impact on almost every field of life, it has also opened new avenues not only in teaching learning but can also be used as an effective tool in the administration of various types of institutions.

4. The Practice

Our institution has decided to encourage the use of WhatsApp groups to increase the effectiveness of teaching learning process. Accordingly, faculty members of the college have formed class and subject wise WhatsApp groups. Through these groups, notes on important topics in the form of PDF, word format have been shared. Audio, image and video files which are related with subject knowledge are also shared. With an active participation of the students, these groups become interactive as faculty members clarify various doubts, queries of the students regarding their respective subjects. These groups are also used for sharing updated knowledge and recent developments in the particular subject and knowledge stream. Some faculty members have also shared explanation of important concepts with the help of their audio lectures. In addition to this, other important academic information, general knowledge, motivational messages have been shared on these groups. The subject related knowledge shared in the forms of images; videos contributed in making teaching learning process interesting for the student community. The college administration has also decided to make proper use of WhatsApp group. It has formed the SJPM WhatsApp Group that includes students as well as teaching and non-teaching staff.

5. Evidence of Success

The subject wise and class wise WhatsApp group has made teaching learning process effective. It becomes evident from the interaction with the students who are otherwise remain silent and hesitate to speak in the classroom. The college administration also finds WhatsApp group beneficial tool of communication for proper, speedy and guaranteed transmission of information. The messaging through WhatsApp groups had saved lot of students form hurdles as the institution is situated in the rural area. Transportation is badly affected. In such sort of emergency situation, students coming from remote area must get timely information. WhatsApp group have fulfilled this need of communication in an emergency situation. IQAC of the college has also formed a separate WhatsApp which proves very helpful for the coordination of various college activities.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required

The proposal to make use of WhatsApp group for teaching learning process has initially created doubts in the minds of teachers. They have raised concerns about misuse of this WhatsApp group. Secondly teachers also pointed out their fear that students might waste their precious time under the excuse of reading WhatsApp group. The presence of girl students in common WhatsApp group is another issue. Few of students have lack of Android phones belong weaker economic condition. The frequent failure of network and its slow speed becomes a hurdle in implementation of this practice. To make this practice of

WhatsApp group for teaching learning process effective, teachers should maintain academic discipline in the group. They must create awareness among the students about the importance of these groups for study purpose. Improvement in the network consistency will certainly enhance the usefulness of this practice.

Response:

Its fact that Lohara is a rural place which is surrounded by the small villages in which maximum people are depend on farming and labouring. Hence, they do not afford today's modern education because of their poverty. However, our college has been working for the entire development of the people living in this area who are deprived of proper means of development.

Being an academic institution, we perform academic duties and responsibilities as per mentioned in vision and object of the institution. Every programme is designed and executed in accordance with institutional goals. The most important aspect of the vision of our college is quality education for rural and privileged society; the development of rural students and to facilitate employment generation. Most of the students are from adjoining villages and from humble financial background. The college has succeeded in providing education to the students from rural areas. The Institution honestly endeavours to open the gates of knowledge to the students who were eager to get education but living in the area which is traditionally popular for drought and lack of industrialization.

The holistic development of students living in remote and earthquake affected areas like Lohara and nearby location is the major concern of the college. The efforts are made to find scope to participate the students in various curricular and extra- curricular activities. Special attention is given to the student in this regard. Through National Service Scheme our student Giram Parmeshwar participated in Avhan state level camp organized by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marthwada Univeristy, Nanded. Ku. Arati Jagtap got third prize in Shot Put at university level Sports Competition. This participation helped to give scope to the leadership skills of the students.

The students have made a great contribution under the best practice of planting trees in college. NSS department of our college organizes programs like plantation and cleanliness drives etc. During the summer efforts were made by the students to keep all the trees alive. Occasionally, water was given to the trees. This helps in creating environmental awareness among the students. Many students have started planting trees at home and in their villages following the example of the best practice of planting trees in college. This effort is useful to create environmental consciousness among the students.

The college strives to provide quality education in the college for the all-round development of the students. Out of the 16 full-time teachers in the college, 11 are Ph. D. holders and three are Research Guides. Faculty of our college guide students for taking admission and selecting proper subjects as per their interests. The students of the institution participate in various competitions like debates, oratory, youth festival competitions, etc. held in other colleges. All these efforts help in the development of intellectual skills in the students.

The college organizes various programs on gender equity, and health etc. NSS organizes rallies and conducts campus to create awareness about social responsibility, work culture and patriotism etc. among students. The college believes that the education is the only remedy for all the problems. The first priority of our college is to provide education which can inculcate values, scientific awareness, national integrity, peace and to provide employment.

The institution organized seven-days special residential camp in nearby villages through NSS to inculcate labour culture from the student days. Attempts are made to develop the students holistically through intellectual and physical activities. With this camp, students not only do their own work but also find a way to live a self-reliant life. The institution worked for the water conservation of adopted villages Mogha (Bk.) and Malegaon. The deepening and widening Nala, Tree plantation and cleanliness program were carried out. Students made vanrai Bandhara for the water conservation and it helped to increase the water level of the neighbouring farmers. The villagers honored the college by awarding an appreciation certificate.

5. CONCLUSION
